# 'Sinister' LJP brings JDU down

With polling trends on Tuesday showing Janata Dal (United) underperforming in a big way, Lok Janshakti Party president Chirag Paswan appeared to be succeeding in damaging Bihar Chief Minister Nitish Kumar-led party by playing a major role in its poor show in many seats.

The LJP, though, itself looked to have paid a big price in the process, as the Election Commission data till 5.30 pm showed that neither it had won nor it was leading even in a single seat while drawing around over 5.6 per cent of votes.

Paswan's party has, however, been instrumental in the JDU's loss in at least 30 seats, as per the latest trends made public by the Election Commission.

As per the latest EC data, JDU had won two and was leading in 41 seats, a big drop from 71 seats it had won in 2015 assembly polls.

JDU spokesperson K C Tyagi told PTI that a "sinister" campaign was run against Nitish Kumar as part of a "conspiracy".

"Apne bhi shamil aur begane bhi (Our own also harmed us along with the outsiders)," he said, without taking any names.

He, however, expressed confidence that Kumar will become the chief minister again, noting that top BJP leaders including Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Home Minister Amit Shah have made it clear that he will head the government if the ruling NDA retains power.

The BJP was leading or had won in 71 seats, according to the EC trends. Two other NDA members were leading in eight seats.

The NDA in total had won or was leading in 122 seats while the RJD-led opposition had won or was ahead in 110 seats.



# Brand Nitish fails to compete with young Tejashwi in Bihar; BJP steals the show Modi the saviour, once again

In an exciting thriller that was likened by many to an IPL superover, the BJP-led NDA on Tuesday managed to get a simple majority with 122 seats in the 243-member Bihar Assembly. The Grand Alliance under the leadership of RJD leader Tejashwi Yadav came too close for comfort for the ruling dispensation.

However, it was clear that brand Nitish Kumar didn't have much impact on the electorate of the state. It was Prime Minister Narendra Modi's charisma that worked and proved all exit polls wrong.

Sources said NDA began preparations for the formation of the new government late in the evening, following a meeting at the house of Chief Minister Nitish Kumar.

In the first two phases of the elections held on October 28 and November 3, the NDA could not get satisfactory results and in some districts like Kaimur and Rohtas, none of its candidates could succeed.

PM Modi made all the difference after he led the NDA campaign for the third phase covering Seemanchal and Kosi regions having sizeable Muslim and Yadav voters. This is where he latched on to the Jungle Ke Yuvraj slogan against the Grand Alliance's CM candidate Tejashwi Prasad Yadav.

Going the results, Modi's plan was successful in checking the influence of the RJD and the Congress. To the surprise of many JDU leaders, the RJD and the Congress failed to seek favours from the electorate, while the BJP and JDU won in Purnia, Kishanganj and Araria districts.



## CM aspirant Pushpam Priya of Plurals party bags less than NOTA

Pushpam Priya Chaudhary, 28, a London School of Economics (LSE) alumnus, who had floated her own political outfit 'Plurals Party' and declared herself a contender for the Bihar Chief ministerial post, suffered a

blow on Tuesday after trends of the Bihar Assembly results showed her trailing from both the assembly seats she contested from.

Chaudhary has contested from the Bankipur assembly constituency in Patna district and the Bisfi seat in Madhubani district where she had merely received a few votes on both the seats. On the Bisfi seat, she had

managed to bag less votes than None of the Above (NOTA) option. Priya had managed just 121 votes coming in third position on the Bankipur assembly seat when reports last came in while three-time BJP MLA Nitin Naveen was leading with 2,385 votes followed by Congress candidate Luv Sinha, son of actor-turned-politician Shatrughan Sinha.

International shooter Shreyanshi Singh who contested on a BJP candidate was successful in Jamui by 30,000 votes. Bihar assembly speaker Sarairanjana by 1,200 votes.

Two independents, Ajit Kumar and Sumit Kumar Singh, won from Kanti and Chakai respectively.

Victory margin of former DG of police, Sunil Kumar of JDU, in Bhorey was 600 votes against CPI(ML) candidate Jitendra Paswan. RJD's candidate from Dehri Fateh Bahadur Singh won by 81 votes. One candidate from Bahadurganj won by four votes and Chandrika Rai of JDU, father-in-law of Lalu's

son Tejpratap Yadav lost by only 12 votes to Chhotelal Rai of RJD. Bahubali RJD candidates Anant Singh and Reetlal Yadav retained their seats. Chetan Anand, son of jailed leader Anand Mohan won Sheohar on a RJD ticket. However, his mother Lovely Anand lost from Saharasa as a RJD candidate.

# EC rubbishes fraud charges

The Election Commission on Tuesday said it has never worked under anybody's pressure and refuted the RJD's allegations about not giving winning certificates to candidates of the Grand Alliance.

The RJD in a tweet had put out a list of 119 seats where the Grand Alliance candidates had won after completion of counting, and returning officers had allegedly congratulated them for the victory, but they are not given certificates.

Deputy Election Commissioner Chandra Bhusan said the poll body has learnt about this tweet and cited the results and trends are available on the Election Commission website constituency wise. "At 10 pm, we are here. The results of 146 seats have been declared. In 97 cases trends are available. So this is the factual situation available in the public domain for everybody to see and witness."

The poll body said the last few phases of counting are remaining in Bihar polls, and it may hold another press conference at midnight, if required, with the final update on the polls. It was not clear whether the counting of ballots will continue throughout the night.

However, when asked about the list of 119 candidates put out by the RJD, Senior Deputy Election Commissioner, Umesh Sinha, clarified that whatever information is it with the Election Commission is authentic information, as it reaches the poll body after data is authenticated. "There can be some gaps in the information: the information with them and the official information," he added.

# Cong contests on more seats, but bags few

The Congress contested 70 seats in Bihar, the second largest after the Rashtriya Janata Dal's 144, but its flop show, worse than the last elections in 2015, might cost the chief ministership of RJD leader Tejashwi Yadav, though a clear picture was not in sight at the time of going to print.

Delay in the results is attributed to only seven counting tables laid instead of 14 in the past owing to the fewer hands available for counting on account of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Until 7.20 PM, only 31 of the 243 results were out.

The Congress had contested 41 seats in 2015 and won 27. Its score kept hovering around 20 on Tuesday. This is despite active campaigning by Congress president Rahul Gandhi.

Even in the bypolls spread over 11 states, the party fared poorly, winning or leading on only 9 seats out of the total 59. In Uttar Pradesh, it could not win even one seat despite senior leader Priyanka Gandhi backing the candidates and the party hogging a lot of attention following the Hathras incident.

The message from the results of the Bihar Assembly elections and the bypolls in different states coming to the fore now is clear -- the Congress has to come out with a new plan to go to the electorate, as the general trends of the results show that the grand old party has to do much more to counter the BJP.

Despite all the factors favouring the Grand Alliance in Bihar, the Congress is unlikely to repeat its 2015 numbers in the

state as per the trends coming in.

In Madhya Pradesh bypolls too, the Congress has fared poorly with the party failing to return to power.

Similarly, the party failed to live up to the expectations in most other states, barring in Haryana where the Congress has won the lone seat in Baroda in Sonapat district, though analysts feel that it is more of a personal victory for party strongman and former Chief Minister of Haryana, Bhupinder Singh Hooda.



The Congress in Bihar fared badly as despite contesting 70 seats, it could not add to the strength of the Grand Alliance. Party insiders say that the Congress needs course correction in taking on the BJP.

It needs to be mentioned here that the dissent group within the Congress had recently written to interim Congress chief Sonia Gandhi, demanding sweeping reforms in the party.

The Congress leaders responsible for the elections in Bihar are silent on the issue of electoral loss, and the spokespersons were left to defend the party post the loss. Congress leader Rahul Gandhi campaigned for four days in Bihar, but could not rally the support behind the party candidates.

Results show not possible to write off Left: Yechury

With the three Left parties bagging seven seats and leading in 10 others in Bihar, CPI(M) general secretary Sitaram Yechury warned naysayers against writing them off, saying had they been given more seats, they would have notched up higher numbers in the elections.

As of 9 pm on Tuesday evening, the CPI(ML) won six of the 19 seats they fought on and was leading in six, the

CPI(M), which competed on four seats, won one and was leading in two others, and the CPI, which contested on six seats, won one and was leading in two.

The Left parties contested on 29 seats in the Bihar Assembly elections. "We were clear from the beginning that we have to defeat the BJP. Our strike rate in Bihar is 80 per cent and if we had been given more seats, we would have contributed more to the Gathbandhan tally," he said.
